Awards and Grants

Boahen-Wilks Article Prize is awarded by the GSA to recognize scholarship that best exemplifies the rigor, innovation and interdisciplinary nature of Ghana Studies. The prize is named in honor of two pioneering scholars—Albert Adu Boahen and Ivor Wilks.

GSA Research Grants are awarded annually to early career faculty and PhD students based in Ghana to assist with field and/or archival research.

Best Paper by an Emerging Scholar Presented at the GSA Triennial Conference is meant to recognize, encourage and support scholarship by younger researchers. The selected paper will be eligible for consideration for review and publication in *Ghana Studies*.

Additional programs are the GSA Public Forum and the Keynote Lecture during the Annual ASA meetings.

GSA Triennial Conferences

GSA is committed to encouraging interconnections between Ghana Studies scholars in the Global North and in Ghana as evidenced in triennial conferences in Ghanaian academic institutions. The 5th Triennial Conference will be held in the summer of 2023 at the Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology in Kumase. Details will be announced in the coming months.



Submit Your Research




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
